## **Workshop Description**

Japanese woodblock prints are characterized by the luminous brilliance of watercolors printed on Washi, handmade Japanese paper. Unlike Western relief printmaking, no press is used, water is the only solvent, pigments sink deeply into the paper, and minimal workspace is required. This is one form of printmaking you can safely and easily enjoy at home.

Studio work will take us through the skills needed to produce beautiful woodblock prints. Time will be devoted to designing, carving and printing images using traditional techniques and materials. We will work with Shina (Japanese plywood), non-toxic water-based inks, and print on various Japanese papers using hand pressure.

The **Beginner Workshop** will cover the basic techniques required to produce a print using up to four colors. Students who are taking the Beginner Workshop or who have done Moku Hanga in the past are welcome to join the **Advanced Workshop**.

Students in the Advanced Workshop are encouraged to produce a print with up to six colors. Time will be spent exploring techniques and methods as questions arise; students will work at their own pace. Mr. Steiner explains that in the Advanced Workshop, "there will be no set course structure, as such. Assuming that the participants in the Advanced Workshop already have experience making woodblock prints, I will let each individual work at their own pace. Inevitably, of course, there will be problems or sudden unknowns. At this point, I will introduce solutions, if I have them, or we will solve the challenge together and learn something new thereby. Each student's question on technique or method will be the opportunity to teach everyone what to do in such a case. This way, the course should move smoothly while everyone will be getting something valuable from it. I do have some things to teach, and we will get to them at the best timing."

## Instructor

Richard Steiner has been making prints for over 30 years and since 1980 has been teaching Moku Hanga to both Japanese and foreigners, both privately and at Kyoto Seika University. He first began studying Moku Hanga under Masahiko Tokumitsu in Hiroshima in 1970. After 10 years, he received his artist's name, Tosai, and a teacher's license, then opened his own workshop in Kyoto. He is also the founder of KIWA (Kyoto International Woodprint Association), the first association dedicated solely to collecting and exhibiting contemporary woodblock prints. KIWA sponsors an international competition open to all woodblock printmakers. Mr. Steiner's work can be seen in many national and international museums, collections and galleries, including the Bank of America, Tokyo; Metropolitan Museum, New York; Victoria and Albert Museum, London and the Yoseido Gallery, Tokyo. ## **Supply List**

- An idea on paper that you would like to make into a woodblock print, approximately 6" x 8", one to four colors with a 1" to 2" border around the four edges. Have it tracing-ready; that is, not a sketchy sketch, but a hard, clear edged drawing for each color that a knife can outline
- Plastic kitchen garbage bag large enough to hold dampened papers, at least 12" x 16"
- Spray bottle
- Drawing pencils (4H and B or 2B), medium felt tip pen, sketch book
- 18" or 24" ruler

- · Masking tape
- Your own pigments if you wish (watercolors, sumi,\* gouache\* or Akua Kolor\* are appropriate for *Moku Hanga*. Some pigments will be supplied by the workshop for everyone to share.)
- Small jars (Cuppers\*) or bottles to hold pigments. Bring as many as there will be colors in your print plus two more large enough to hold a small (2" x 3") sponge. Must have air-tight lids. Clear containers are more useful in the long run because you can see the color of the ink inside
- · Larger jar or container to hold water for soaking and cleaning brushes
- · Rags or old wash cloths, two or three
- Several small watercolor brushes (Steiner Mixing Brushes\*) for transferring ink to the block
- Printing brushes, at least one of these: 18mm, 24mm or 30mm Surikomi Bake.\* One larger brush, a 45mm or 60mm Surikomi, is recommended but not required. If you have them, Hanga Bake\* or Maru Bake\* are also fine.
- Mizu Bake,\* anywhere between 15cm and 18cm (6" to 7") wide; or a thick, natural hair paint brush
- · Small, fairly soft kitchen scrub brush or toothbrush for cleaning the block after carving
- Carving tools, at least one each of these (or similar) sizes: 3mm, 7.5mm and 12mm u-gouges; 4.5mm and/or 6mm knife; 12mm chisel. (McClain's Woodblock Tools\*)
- 9" x 12" or 12" x 16" bench hook\*
- Nori\* (rice paste)
- Baren: inexpensive student baren\* or Disk Baren\*
- Apron

## **Supply List for Week 2**

All of the above. Also, bring an idea for a print that may include up to 6 colors; about the same size as above, or slightly bigger. Plan the work to include an overlaying of colors, some very fine-line carving, and make gray one of the colors.

Newsprint to make damp packs

Ategami ("Back Paper" which protects the moistened Washi from the baren rubbing)\*

All Shina wood blocks\*

Sandpaper and sanding blocks

Black sumi ink, colored gouache\*

Fingertip protectors

Red double-sided carbon paper\*

Mylar tracing film

Tosai Motor Sharpener\*

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
## Location of the Workshop at Marylhurst University
